In order to promote Kiwanis-Family Relations, every Key Club is encouraged to participate in projects with not only their sponsoring Kiwanis Club, but other Key Clubs, and other K-Family organizations. Give these project ideas a try, and be sure to include them on your monthly report to receive credit!

## Projects for Everyone

### -Kiwanis Peanut or Pancake Days

Work with your sponsoring Kiwanis club to help distribute peanuts, or to help at their Pancake Day. Key Clubbers (and even Builders Club and K-Kids) to serve pancakes, bus tables, or staff a Kiwanis/Key Club information booth.

### -Clean-up Day

Bring together Key Clubbers and Kiwanians to organize a clean-up in your area. You can pick up garbage in parks, along rivers, or along a road. You may consider securing your own stretch of highway through "Adopt-a-Highway", so your K-Family could work together on a regular basis.

### -Collection Competition

Have a little friendly competition between the branches of the K-Family (or another Key Club) to see who can collect the most supplies for an animal shelter, emergency shelter, troops overseas, or a local nursing shelter or children's home. Make it fun by placing bins in the schools and encouraging the student body to donate. This is especially fun around the holidays.

## Working with K-Kids and Builders Club

Remember that you don't always have to plan special projects for K-Kids and Builders Club members to participate in. Volunteer to help with their projects, or to speak at their meetings. Members of these clubs can help at some of your activities too.
